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Dear Reader:

The Board of Crime Control has issued an annual report on Crime in Montana since 1974. The Board believes that crime statistics provide important information for understanding, measuring and managing law enforcement activities in Montana. The crime statistics that are reflected in the annual crime report help the board to focus grant decisions, help criminal justice practitioners to understand law enforcement needs in our state, and ultimately help public policy makers in establishing directions for the criminal and juvenile justice systems.

Many changes have taken place in crime reporting over the past twenty-five plus years that Crime in Montana has been published. In 1974 crime was being reported on a summary basis using primarily manual systems. Today, the majority of law enforcement agencies report very detailed incident based statistics using computerized reporting systems.

The crime statistics that are reported in the 2000 annual report provide summary information about crime rates in Montana. Within the next couple of years the statistical information that will be reflected in the Crime in Montana Report will change dramatically. In the near future, because so many jurisdictions are capturing and reporting detailed incident based crime statistics, the Board of Crime Control will be able to generate a much more detailed picture of crimes in Montana. The more detailed picture of who commits crimes, who the victims are and precisely when and where the crime occurs should help criminal and juvenile justice professionals to better manage their meager resources.

This report reflects two kinds of information. One is "crime rate" and the other is detailed information on crimes from each reporting law enforcement jurisdiction. Because the number of reporting law enforcement agencies fluctuates from year to year, "crime rate" is considered to be the most useful tool available to measure general trends in the overall incidence of crime. Detailed data for all police departments and sheriff's offices are listed in Table 8, which starts on page 24 of the report.

In 2000, crime data collected from Montana law enforcement agencies reflects a 1.0% drop in the crime rate. It should be noted that 85% of the law enforcement agencies reported either a paper summary or a detailed electronic data file. This is the same percentage that reported in 1999.

The drop in the overall crime rate in 2000 reflects the combined change of the seven index crimes. Homicide, robbery, burglary, and larceny were the four index crimes which had a decline in the number of reported offenses. The three index crimes which increased in 2000 were rape, aggravated assault, and motor vehicle theft.

A total of 4,057 index crimes per 100,000 people were reported in 2000 compared to 4,099 reported in 1999. The rates for the individual crime categories that increased in 2000 are all reported rates per 100,000 people. The increased rates were rape, 35.7; aggravated assault, 263.8 and motor vehicle theft of 219.8. The rates for the four declining crime categories were homicide, 2.3; robbery, 23.5; burglary, 420.1 and larceny, 3092.3.

Finally, the Board of Crime Control wants to commend law enforcement agencies in this state for their dedication and professionalism in making crime statistics available to the Board. It's a big job but also one that has long-term benefits for all of our citizens.

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GENERAL CRIME STATISTICS FROM THE MONTANA UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM

Overview and Introduction

This report contains the most complete, up-to-date and accurate information currently available about crime in the State of Montana. It is intended to address the informational needs of law enforcement administrators, planners, legislators and local government officials.

The data and statistics presented below are initiated primarily by the police departments and sheriff offices throughout the state. These agencies provide basic information about each crime which is reported to them and about each arrest they make to the Montana Incident Based Reporting (MTIBR) system. In turn, the MTIBR program feeds data into the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) national Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) program.

The number of reporting agencies can fluctuate from year to year. The following page will give you some idea of the size of jurisdictions of the non-reporting agencies. The non-reporting agencies make up 14.9% of the law enforcement agencies and the jurisdiction of non-reporting agencies accounts for 4.4% of Montana's population. This makes it difficult to use the number of offenses reported for year-to-year comparisons. A better measure of the trend would be a comparison of the crime rates as discussed and displayed on page 6-17. To see which agencies are included in this report, go to Table 8 starting on page 24.

It is emphasized that the amount and type of crime reported in this document is based upon the number of reported offenses and does not measure those offenses unknown to the law enforcement community. Many crimes, for example, may go unreported because the victims are unaware they have been victimized or have themselves been participants in illegal activity.

At the same time, many sociological and environmental factors influence the type and volume of criminal activity in a particular geographical area. These include the density and size of the community, demographic characteristics of the populations, the economic status of the population, educational, recreational, and religious characteristics of the population, effective strength of local law enforcement agencies, policies of prosecuting officials and the courts, and public attitudes toward laws and law enforcement. Many of these are beyond the ability of local law enforcement agencies to control.



STATE CRIME INDEX



Because of the serious nature, the frequency of occurrence and the reliability of their reporting, the crimes of willful homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny/theft, and motor vehicle theft are used as a gauge with which to measure the amount of crime and how much it increases or decreases over time. The crime index is the total number of these offenses that comes to the attention of law enforcement agencies.


Out of 116 police departments and sheriffs offices in Montana, 85 percent of them (98 agencies) participated in reporting to the Board of Crime Control. The percentage of Montana's total population, which was covered by the jurisdictions of the reporting agencies, is 95.6%. The agencies that participated in reporting have reported a 1% lower rate of crime in 2000 compared to 1999.

Refer to the crime *rates* on pages 6-17 for the most accurate measure of the change in crime from year to year.

Following are the statewide counts of index crimes for 2000: total index crimes, 35,005; homicide, 20; rape, 308; robbery, 203; aggravated assault, 2,276; burglary, 3,624; larceny, 26,678; and motor vehicle theft, 1,896. Violent crimes, which include homicide, rape, robbery and aggravated assault, totaled 2,807 offenses.

Violent crimes account for 8.0% of all index crimes, while property offenses make up the other 92.0%.

STATE CRIME RATE



The **crime rate** of a given area is defined as the number of index crimes per 100,000 people. By using rates per population, comparisons can be made between jurisdictions of unequal populations. The crime rate takes into consideration the total population of the reporting jurisdictions; however, the rate does not incorporate other elements, such as sociological and environmental factors that may contribute to the amount of crime reported in a given community.


The population figures used to calculate the state's crime rate for 2000 were provided by the U. S. Bureau of Census through the FBI. Montana's population estimate for 2000 was 902,195 people. The total population of the jurisdictions of law enforcement agencies which reported to the Board of Crime Control was 862,734. This adjusted population figure is used to calculate the crime rate. The rate per 100,000 people is calculated by multiplying the total index crime count by 100,000, then dividing by the total population of the jurisdictions of reporting agencies.

Law enforcement agencies reported 4,057 index crimes per 100,000 people during 2000. This rate registers a 1.0% drop in crime from 1999 to 2000. The rate in 1999 was 4,099 per 100,000 people. Of the seven major crimes used in the calculation of the crime rate, declines were seen in homicide, robbery, burglary and larceny. The three index crimes which increased were rape, aggravated assault, and motor vehicle theft.

Homicides dropped by 8.5%, robbery was reported as being down by 13.2%, the burglary rate was down by 4.3% and larceny/theft was reported with a decline of 3.7%. Property crimes went down by 3.4% due to the drop in larceny/theft. Violent crimes increased by a sizable 37.4% due to a 51.6% increase in the number of aggravated assaults and a 7.5% increase in reported rapes. The other index crime recording an increase was motor vehicle theft, up by 3.5%.

VIOLENT CRIMES



Violent Crime is composed of homicide, rape, robbery and aggravated assault. All violent crimes involve force or threat of force.


Law enforcement agencies reported a 51.6% increase in aggravated assaults, and a 7.5 increase in rape, which accounted for the 37.4% increase in violent crime from 1999 to 2000. There are many factors that may have played a part in the increase in violent crimes. Many agencies have new computer based record management systems, which may be accounting for a more accurate counting of crimes. At the same time, crime codes have been rewritten to include more types of offenses which have been written into law in recent years. This may allow for the reporting of more than one offense reported through the investigation. Aggravated assaults in 1999 accounted for 73% of all violent crimes, while in 2000 aggravated assaults made up 81% of the violent crimes.

Violent crimes were reported 325.4 times per 100,000 persons in 2000, compared to 236.8 per 100,000 persons in 1999. As can be seen in the trend line (solid dark straight line) on the chart above, violent crime has been increasing slightly over the past ten years.

Rape was another violent crime reported as higher in 2000 than in 1999. A 7.5% increase was calculated in rape over the 12-month period. The other two crimes used in the figuring the violent crime rate are homicide and robbery. They were down by 8.5% and 13.2% respectively.

Montana had 2,807 violent crimes committed during 2000. The Crime Clock recorded one violent crime every 2 hours, 59 minutes.

HOMICIDE



Homicide is the willful, non-negligent killing of one human being by another. It includes murder and non-negligent manslaughter, but does not include justifiable homicide where an offender is killed by a police officer in the line of duty or a felon killed during the commission of a crime by a private citizen.

During 2000, law enforcement agencies reported 2.3 homicides per 100,000 people. This count continues a slight decline in recent years, as can be seen by the trend line (solid dark straight line) in the chart above. In 1999 the rate was only slightly higher at 2.5.


While Montana is a fairly small state when looking at population, the changes in the rate of homicide seem quite substantial on the chart. When the counts are low as they are in Montana, any fluctuation shows up on the graph above. The average homicide rate over the past three years has been 2.3 per 100,000 persons, while in the previous three years (1995-1997) the average rate was 4.2.

There were 20 homicides reported in Montana during 2000; the same as compared to 1999.

The national rate for homicide in 2000 was 5.5 per 100,000 inhabitants, making Montana's 2000 homicide rate 58% lower.

The Crime Clock shows one homicide committed every 17 days, 9 hours. During 2000 homicides accounted for less than 1% of all violent crimes.

RAPE




Rape is defined in Montana as "Sexual intercourse without consent" which is when a person knowingly has sexual intercourse without consent of another person. Both rape and attempts to commit rape by force are included in this definition. Statutory rape (without force) and sexual assaults against males are classified as a sexual offenses and are not counted under this classification.

As can be seen on the trend line (solid dark straight line) in the chart above, there has been a gradual increase in the rate of rapes being reported to law enforcement over the past 10 years. During 2000 there were 35.7 rapes per 100,000 people reported. This is a 75.8% increase over the 1991 rate of 20.0.

There were 308 rapes reported in 2000. This is 17.6% higher than the 1999 count of 262.

Looking at the Crime Clock, we can see that there was a rape reported in Montana every 27 hours, 12 minutes.

ROBBERY



Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons. This is done by force or the threat of force or violence. Robbery is a crime in which the element of personal confrontation between the victim and offender is present. Attempts to commit robbery are included in the robbery count.


Even though the robbery rate dropped by 13.2 percent in 2000, the trend line (solid dark straight line) in the chart above shows the trend as being quite level over the past ten years. The 2000 rate of 23.5 compares to a rate of 27.1 in 1999. Robbery was reported as being the index crime with the largest decline in 2000.

Robberies accounted for only 7.2% of all violent crimes in 2000. The rate of 23.5 robberies per 100,000 people is the lowest rate reported since 1991 when the rate of robbery was 22.1.

The data from 98 law enforcement agencies had a count of 203 robberies in 2000.

The crime clock shows robberies in Montana being reported every 41 hours, 19 minutes.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT



Aggravated assault is the unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon, or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Any assault that does not involve the use of a weapon and does not result in serious injury is classified as a simple assault and is reported under a separate crime category.

Aggravated assaults accounted for 81% of all violent crimes in 2000. The increase in violent crimes (37.4%) in 2000 is due to the rise in the reported aggravated assaults. Aggravated assaults rose by 51.6% from 1999 to 2000.


There are many factors that may have contributed to this increase. One possible factor is the fact that many of the law enforcement agencies are now using computerized record management systems which might be producing higher, more accurate counts. In addition, there are additional Montana statutes in recent years that fall into the aggravated assault category. At this time there is no single answer for the reason for an above average aggravated assault increase.

The aggravated assault rate of 263.8 in 2000 compares to a rate of 174.0 per 100,000 people in 1999. The trend line (solid dark straight line) in the chart above shows the rate of aggravated assaults reflecting a steady increase over the years.

There were 2,276 assaults officially reported to law enforcement in 2000.

The Crime Clock shows an aggravated assault being reported once every 3 hours, 41 minutes.

BURGLARY



Burglary is the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. The theft of items from a building is classified as burglary if it is accompanied by a breaking or unlawful entry (trespass) without breaking. If the building is open to the general public and the offender has legal access, it is considered a larceny.


Burglaries have been gradually declining, which can be noted when looking at the trend line (solid dark straight line) in the chart above. From 1999 to 2000 the rate dropped from 438.9 incidents per 100,000 persons to a rate of 420.1. This reflects a 4.3% drop in burglary during 2000.

There were 3,624 burglaries reported to law enforcement during 2000. This compares to 3,464 incidents reported to law enforcement in 1999.

Property crimes are made up of burglary, larceny and motor vehicle theft. When looking at all property crimes, burglaries account for 11.3% of the total.

The crime clock for Montana shows an average of one burglary every 2 hours, 19 minutes.

LARCENY



Larceny is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Larceny includes such crimes as pickpocket, purse snatching, shoplifting, theft from motor vehicles, and theft from buildings where forced entry is not involved. It does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, or bad checks. Similarly motor vehicle theft is not included in this category since it is considered a major crime by itself.


Larceny is the most often reported index crime. In fact, larcenies make up 76% of the total index crimes which are used to calculate the overall crime rate. Generally we see the change in the overall crime rate showing a very high correlation to the change in the rate of larcenies reported. In 2000, however, larceny dropped by 3.7% and the overall crime rate dropped by only 1%. This was due mostly to the high number of aggravated assault reported in 2000.

Law enforcement agencies reported 3,092.3 thefts per 100,000 people occurring in 2000. This compares to a rate of 3,211.0 in 1999. The larceny rate has fluctuated slightly over the past ten years, yet the trend line (solid dark straight line) in the chart above reflects a very gradual decline over the years.

There were a total of 26,678 larceny occurrences in 2000.

Every 18 minutes 50 seconds an occurrence of larceny was reported to law enforcement in 2000.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT




Motor vehicle theft is defined as the theft of or attempted theft of a vehicle that is self-propelled and runs on the surface and not on rails. It includes automobiles, trucks, buses, vans, motorcycles and snowmobiles. It does not include motorboats, construction equipment, airplanes and farming equipment.

On average, motor vehicle thefts have remained level over the past ten years, even though the rates from year to year have fluctuated. This is reflected in the trend line (solid dark straight line) shown in the above chart. The rate per 100,000 people for 2000 was 219.8, a 3.5% increase over the 1999 rate of 212.2. This is the first increase recorded since the rate began falling in after 1997.

The total number of stolen vehicles reported to law enforcement agencies was 1,896 in 2000.

The Crime Clock shows a motor vehicle theft occurring 5.4 times per day or one every 4 hours, 25 minutes.

DRUG OFFENSES




Drug offenses involve the unlawful possession, sale, use, cultivation, and manufacturing of controlled substances and narcotic drugs.

Drug offense reports continue to climb as can be seen by the trend line (solid dark straight line) in the chart above. The number of drug offenses recorded by law enforcement agencies in 2000 was up by slightly over 7% from 1999. A rate of 628.8 offenses per 100,000 people compares to 586.4 in 1999.

The total number of drug offenses in 2000 was 5,425, while the count for 1999 was 4,628.

Law enforcement is either receiving a call or experiencing an on-site encounter involving drug offenses every 1 hour, 33 minutes, or an average of 15.5 drug offenses being reported every day in Montana.

SEX OFFENSES



Sex offenses include offenses such as sexual assault, deviate sexual conduct¹, indecent exposure and incest. Excluded under this category are forcible rape, prostitution and commercial vice.

In the chart above, the trend line (solid dark straight line) shows a gradual decline in sex offense reports over the years; however, the numbers reported in 2000 are up from 1999. A rate of 123.8 sex offenses per 100,000 people in 2000 is 18.6% higher than the rate of 104.4 in 1999. Prior to this increase the counts had been decreasing by an average of 10% per year since 1994.


Law enforcement agencies had 1,068 sex offenses reported in 2000.

A sex offense was reported every 7 hours, 51 minutes in Montana during 2000.

DOMESTIC ABUSE



A person commits the offense of Partner or family member assault if he/she: (a) purposely or knowingly causes bodily injury to a family member or household member; or (b) purposely or knowingly causes reasonable apprehension of bodily injury to a family member or household member.

For record keeping purposes, partner or family member assault offenses were broken out from all other assaults beginning in 1988. The rate at which reports are received by law enforcement have been gradually increasing since then. A greater awareness and more accurate record keeping may account for some of the increase.

A rate of 480 incidents per 100,000 people translates to 4,330 offenses of partner or family member assault in 2000.

In 2000, 4,141 partner or family member assaults were reported to law enforcement agencies, compared to 3,195 in 1999. This figures to be a 29.6% increase in the past year.

A partner or family member assault was reported, on average, every 2 hours, 1 minute, or about 12 occurrences per day reported to law enforcement.
