## **Exceptional Clearances**

According to the FBI, clearing an offense by exceptional means requires the following <u>four conditions be met</u>:

1. The investigation must have clearly and definitely established the identity of

- at least one offender:
- 2. Sufficient probable cause must have been developed to support the arrest, charging, and prosecution of the offender;

  3. The exact location of the offender must be known so that an arrest could be
- made; and
- 4. There must be a reason outside the control of law enforcement which prevents the arrest.

Acceptable Exceptional Clearance codes:

- A = Death of Offender
- B = Prosecution Declined (by the prosecutor for other than lack of probable cause)
- C = In Custody of Other Jurisdiction
- D = Victim Refused to Cooperate (in the prosecution)
- E = Juvenile/No Custody (the handling of a juvenile without taking him/her into custody, but rather by oral or written notice given to the parents or legal quardian in a case involving a minor offense)
