



## MBCC Strategic Goals

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### **Goal 1: Support efforts to improve Criminal Justice Data collection and sharing across the state (2023-2024).**

1. Partner with legislature, stakeholders, and information technology resources to facilitate data collection efforts.
2. Research funding opportunities to assist criminal justice data collection efforts.

### **Goal 2: Reduce crimes against persons, property, and society through effective drug enforcement and education.**

1. Increase law enforcement investigative activities by 5% per year, to include disrupting at least one (1) Drug Trafficking Organization (DTO) annually, per HIDTA standards.
2. Increase prevention education initiatives by 10% per year.
3. Implement deconfliction compliance measures for JAG-funded Multi-Jurisdictional Drug Task Forces (MJDTFs).

### **Goal 3: Provide opportunities and resources to strengthen and sustain victim services at the program and community level.**

1. Increase subgrantee knowledge of potential funding by providing quarterly information regarding grant and training opportunities.
2. Increase total funding available for victim services funding.

### **Goal 4: Support jail alternatives through early interventions, chemical dependency treatment services, jail diversion programs, and restorative justice initiatives by 2026.**

1. Maintain the number of individuals served by MBCC funded early intervention programs (about 300 per year).
2. Support ongoing creation and expansion of early interventions, substance use disorder (SUD) treatment services, jail diversion programs, and restorative practices.
3. Provide training and education for early interventions, SUD treatment services, jail diversion programs, and restorative practices (ongoing)
4. Provide feedback opportunities for RSAT partners to discuss challenges and possible solutions to make the program more accessible by March 2024 Board meeting.

### **Goal 5: Implementation of Criminal Justice Data Warehouse (JDW) per Senate Bill 11**

1. Partner with local and state agencies, the courts, and community organizations to identify and address barriers and concerns of implementing JDW.
  2. Partner with local and state agencies, the courts, and community organizations to identify the potential benefits, of JDW.
  3. Create a plan to present to the 2025 legislature to effectively scale and properly resource the JDW data structure statewide.
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
