Missing Children Information Program

- MT DOJ shall establish a missing children information program to create a central repository to aid in the location of missing children in Montana.
- Establish a system of intrastate communication of information relating to any child determined to be missing.
- Provide a centralized file for the exchange of information of missing children within the state.
- Interface with NCIC
- Provide OPI with a list of missing Montana school-aged children.

CLEARINGHOUSE DUTIES

- Assists law enforcement agencies with entering the necessary information into state and federal databases for missing and unidentified persons
- Provides general assistance and information to the public concerning missing persons
- Works with NCMEC and other state clearinghouses to aid in locating children who have been unlawfully taken out of Montana or brought into Montana
- Maintains an online database of missing persons in Montana to ensure schools are aware

ADDRESSING AN EPIDEMIC:

MISSING AND MURDERED INDIAN WOMEN



Hanna's Act, 44-2-407

- Establishes Missing Person Specialist within Montana DOJ
 - May assist with Missing Persons
 Investigations
 - Provide guidance & support to LE and families
 - Oversee MP entries into NCIC
 - Manage MMPC & MT Missing Person
 Database
 - Provide public outreach & education on MP's
 - Facilitate training to LEA's
 - Appointed to MMIP Task Force

CUSTODIAL INTERFERENCE

- 44-2-504 If LE receives a report that they reasonably believe is a case of custodial interference, LE shall collect data about all parties, suspects, and the child
- If the location of the child is unknown, law enforcement must take a missing persons report



44-2-408 ADULT REPORTING & "THE BUCK STOPS HERE"

- 1st agency contacted takes a missing person report **or** ensures that another law enforcement agency is taking the missing person report
- Under 21 Enter into NCIC within 2 hours
- Over 21 Enter into NCIC within 8 hours



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Montana Missing Indigenous Persons Task Force 44-2-411

- Established Task Force, allocated to MT DOJ for staffing and administrative purposes only
- Appointees are appointed by the Attorney General, membership isn't limited to but must include:
- MT DOJ subject matter expert
- Member of each federally recognized tribe
- MHP
- AG's Office



MMIPTF

- While responding government to government relationships between the state and each tribe, the primary duties are:
- identify jurisdictional barriers.
- work to identify causes that contribute to missing and murdered indigenous persons and make recommendations to federally recognized tribes in the state to reduce cases of missing and murdered indigenous persons.
- work to identify strategies to improve interagency communication, cooperation, and collaboration.



MMIPTF

- While responding government to government relationships between the state and each tribe, the primary duties are:
- By July 1st prior to each legislative session, the task force shall prepare a written report of findings and recommendations for submission to the STRC. This report must include statistics and LINC grant information.

LOOPING IN NATIVE COMMUNITIES GRANT PROGRAM 44-2-412

- Established the LINC program in support of Montana's tribes to identify, report, and find Native Americans who are missing. The grant program is administered by the MIPTF.
- Separate database of missing persons where people can report loved ones missing without direct law enforcement contact.

OPI PHOTO REPOSITORY

MCA 20-7-1317 required OPI to create and maintain a photo repository of MT students for exclusive purpose of locating missing school-aged children.

Program is "opt in" but OPI still averages about 25% of student images in the repository.

National Missing and Unidentified Person System (NamUs)

National Missing and Unidentified Persons System

 Clearinghouse enters missing persons that have been missing over 90 days



Other duties...

- Facilitate Training to Law Enforcement and the general public
- Supporting families of missing loved ones
- Network with out-of-state clearinghouses & POC for NCMEC
- Issue public alerts

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AMBER ALERT AMERICA'S MISSING: BROADCAST EMERGENCY RESPONSE



- There is reasonable belief by law enforcement that a child has been abducted or has disappeared under suspicious circumstances.
- The missing child is age 17 years or younger, or has a proven mental disability.
 The law enforcement agency believes the child is in imminent danger of serious bodily injury or death.



 There is enough descriptive information about the victim and abduction for law enforcement to issue an AMBER Alert to assist in the recovery of the child.

MEPA Missing Endangered Person Advisory

- Can be an Adult or a Child.
- Missing under unexplained, involuntary, suspicious circumstances.
- Believed to be in danger (age, health, mental/physical disability, environmental/weather conditions, potentially with a dangerous person).
- Information released to the public may assist in recovery.

MEPA's often are limited to a specific geographic area Media has discretion on broadcasting MEPA

BLUE ALERT





- Peace officer has been killed or seriously injured in the line of duty.
- A law enforcement agency has determined the suspect poses a serious threat to the public, to other peace officers, or both.
- Sufficient information exists about the suspect or about the death or injury so that the alert would assist in the capture of the individual.

 When looking at missing persons by gender by race, this is one of the times we see data slightly skewed.

 60/40 Females to Males amongst Indigenous Persons



 When looking at 1,906 cleared cases from 2022, 1349 were under age 18. Just under 71% of all missing person cases. If we look at those between ages 18 and 21, the number is actually 73% of all missing person cases in 2022.

At least 225 juveniles were identified as having been reported missing at least two times. This means that they were reported missing, found, and reported missing again at another point in the year.

99.992% of all persons reported missing in 2022 were located.
