2023 Funding Opportunities

MBCC is seeking applicants for the 2023 John R. Justice (JRJ) Student Loan Repayment Program, 2023 Victims of Crime Act (VOCA), 2023 Sexual Assault Services Program (SASP), and 2023 Domestic Violence Intervention (DVI) Program, funding opportunities.

Applications for JRJ are due on **January 12, 2023** and applications for VOCA, SASP, and DVI are due on **January 26, 2023**.

The 2023 STOP Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) funding opportunity is expected to open in March.

2023 Spring Program Highlight Submissions are Open!

MBCC's Program Highlights honor criminal justice and community-based programs that merit recognition for providing effective services in their communities or statewide. MBCC is currently accepting Program Highlights for the Spring guarter.

Up to two representatives from the selected program will be invited to give a presentation about their program to the Board of Directors at the Board Business Meeting on March 16, 2023. MBCC will showcase the Highlight Program through a statewide press release, certificate of recognition, and placement of program information on the MBCC website. Additionally, the selected program will receive one attendance scholarship to the 2023 Montana Crime Prevention Conference.

December Youth Justice Council Meeting

The Youth Justice Council met to review highlights from the YJC Strategic Planning Retreat and determined priorities and projects for 2023.

The council members are a cross section of public and private employees who are working to prevent or reduce juvenile delinquency and improve the juvenile justice system.

The mission of the Youth Justice Council is to improve the juvenile justice system by serving the best interest of Montana's youth, families, and citizens by supporting research-based programs with positive outcomes.

The Youth Justice Council is responsible for making funding recommendations for the Title II Juvenile Justice and the Delinquency Prevention Program (DPP) funding opportunities to the Board, administering the Do the Write Thing Challenge in Montana, offering Restorative Practices training opportunities, and more.

2023 Do the Write Thing Challenge

The 2023 Do the Write Thing Challenge has begun!

All across America, students are taking action to end youth violence. Montana's Do the Write Thing Challenge is a violence prevention program that encourages middle school students to examine the causes of youth violence, the impact of violence on their lives, and to communicate in written form what they think should be done to reduce youth violence. By encouraging students to make personal commitments to do something about the problem, the program ultimately seeks to give them the opportunity to break the cycles of violence in their homes, schools, and neighborhoods. Do the Write Thing is an initiative of the National Campaign to Stop Violence.

Student writings are due March 10, 2023. Eight State Finalists and two Student National Ambassadors will be selected and invited to the State Recognition Event in Helena in May 2023. The two Student National Ambassadors will be invited to the National Do the Write Thing Recognition Ceremony in Washington D.C. in July 2023.

Law Enforcement Employment Survey

For the second year in a row, MBCC's Statistical Analysis Center received a 100% response rate on the annual Law Enforcement Employment Survey.

The survey is just one example of the outstanding partnership Montana Law Enforcement Agencies have with our Statistical Analysis Center (SAC). Montana has always been ahead of the nation in submitting to the FBI the more detailed National Incident-based Reporting System (NIBRS) crime data. Montana has also lead the nation in law enforcement agency submissions, low error rates, and innovative data collection practices.

Some federal funding formulas are based on NIBRS participation crime numbers. Montana's participation is helping fund local projects such as Justice Assistance Grants (JAG) and the COVID Relief fund grants.

Teamwork matters and your efforts do make a difference. Thank you to the amazing law enforcement partners throughout the state!



MBCC Victim Liaison Update

Over the last year and a half, the State Victim Liaison Project has partnered with victim service providers, allied partners, and the Board of Crime control to identify the most crucial gaps and barriers to accessing services for crime victims and survivors. Thanks to the information that has been collected, the State and Tribal Victim Liaisons have been able to develop a Statewide Needs Assessment that will be sent out to victim service providers and allied partners throughout the state of Montana over the next few months. We are continuing to meet with victim service providers and allies across the state of Montana, as well as beginning to schedule listening sessions for victims, and learning about the best solutions for improving services for survivors. 
Community Listening Session

Elder Justice Investigations Training

For First Responders and Law Enforcement

The training will take place at the Missoula Police Department (435 Ryman St) on Thursday, February 23rd, 2023. The training is a full day training beginning at 8:30am and running until 5:00pm! Lunch will *not* be provided, but there will be an hour break in between to allow for lunch on your own.

With knowledge from professionals working directly within law enforcement and elder justice, you'll receive a comprehensive look at addressing elder abuse investigations, domestic violence, sexual abuse, neglect, and financial exploitation in later life.

The purpose of this training is to provide first responders and law enforcement with an overview of elder abuse and information about:

- investigative strategies,
- possible charges, and
- local resources or services available to assist officers and victims of abuse in later life to enhance older victims' safety and hold offenders accountable.
