Gaps Discussed

Victim/Survivor Gaps:

- Victim information across services
- Officer input and impact statements in cases that involve law enforcement
- Access to resources

Service Provider Gaps and Needs:

• Assistance with victim impact statements and the importance of them

Training Needs:

• Training cost for SANE

Justice System Gaps:

- Mental health services
- Substance use services
- Lack of information and access to information between law enforcement and probation and parole
- Access and availability to SANE
- Lack of consistency across the state, ex: courts e-filing across the state and orders of protection
- Lack of understanding for service providers and victims about orders of protection and no contact orders

- The crime lab cannot testify by person and must travel
- No availability of restorative justice in the community

Other:

• Access to childcare

Solutions Discussed:

Service Provider Specific Solutions:

- In Dillon, there's a mandatory victim services form that is handed out by law enforcement at the time of the crime
- More collaborative relationships being build
- Warm hand-offs (and tepid hand-offs)

Justice System Specific Solutions:

- Access to mental health and substance use services
- Systems should be connected to identify offenders from law enforcement through Department of Corrections
- Availability of SANEs and SANE examinations
- Master resource list and a Resource Assistance Center
- Prevention specialist training
- E-filing statewide
- Standardized paperwork

Broader Solutions:

• Having human trafficking, domestic violence, and sexual assault information available at hotels, bars, and other frequented places

Conclusions reached

Visiting with the service providers and allied partners in the Dillon and Beaverhead area showed us what providers in Montana's more rural communities face. In areas such as Dillon, and the surrounding areas, the lack of resources makes it hard to provide victims with meaningful services. This lack of services and barriers to services makes it hard to keep victims and survivors engaged in the criminal justice system.

Dillon Roundtable Action Plan:

- Brining more players to the table: CPS, APS
- More information on collaborations and bringing resources to communities and together

Without the voices and knowledge of victim service providers and agencies, the voices of victims would not be heard in an offender-centric system.
